1.2 Provide a detailed description of the proposed action, including all proposed activities.

The Museum is the Museum of the 1st/15th Royal NSW Lancers, one of Australia's oldest and its most decorated Regiment. The Museum is located with the Regiment in Commonwealth Heritage listed Lancer Barracks, mainland Australia's oldest military barracks which has been home to the Regiment for over 120 years. The Museum collection is State heritage listed in its entirety. The collection includes a fleet of historic military vehicles made up of vehicle types used by the Regiment during its history, and therefore critically helping to illustrate the Regiment's history and tell its stories. The vehicle fleet includes the last remaining Daimler Dingo Scout Car left in Australia, a Covenanter Bridge Layer Tank, one of only three or four left in the world which we think might have fought at Balikpapan in 1945, Australia's largest ever armoured assault. The jewel in the crown of the fleet is a fully restored and mobile WW2 Matilda Tank named ACE, the first tank off the landing craft during the Balikpapan campaign, mounted by the Lancers, then called the 1st Armoured Regiment (AIF)(RNSWL). This tank has national heritage significance and is the only one of three surviving Balikpapan Matildas left in the world today capable of restoration back to full mobility and its original WW2 condition. The restoration, undertaken by Lancer Museum volunteers, has taken 6 years, \$100K and almost 40K volunteer hours to complete. It has been awarded a coveted National Trust conservation award and the restoration described as globally unique and world leading work by the Director of the UK's Bovington Tank Museum, arguably the finest tank Museum in the world. ACE is the only British or Commonwealth tank which saw action in any theatre of the war to be fully restored and returned to its WW2 fighting unit. It therefore arguably also has international heritage significance.

The Museum is one of the last remaining official military museums dedicated to keeping its historic vehicles restored and fully mobile. At present, the entire fleet is kept in the open, covered by tarpaulins, a very poor method of trying to protect and preserve any vehicle or metal based equipment. The Museum is open to the public and its vehicles, including ACE, are available and in demand to participate in community events throughout the Sydney area. However the need to "untarp" the vehicles for public inspection is very time consuming, tiring and counterproductive for vehicle preservation.

Our project is to erect overhead cover for the entire vehicle fleet. The design and materials used will be similar to modern carports, with solid end panels to each structure, but with clear plastic curtains, similar to the drop down weather shields extensively used today in restaurants with outdoor dining areas. The siting and colour of the metal components (green) is designed to



minimise the visual impact on important site lines within Lancer Barracks; the structures will be gabled with a roof pitch of 22 1/2 degrees, to harmonise with the gabled roof design of the heritage precinct and the original 1820 buildings. The height of the structures will be approximately one story equivalent, with no shadowing onto any part of the heritage precinct. For traffic safety reasons, the Army will shortly change the main entrance into Lancer Barracks from the Western side (off Smith Street) across the central parade ground to the Eastern side, off Little Street. As a result, the proposed site of the museum vehicle overhead cover will no longer sit at the end of the key site line on entering the Barracks, significantly reducing any possible visual impact. The Barracks Heritage Management Plan divides the precinct into a "Heritage precinct" and a "Limited heritage precinct" available for development (Figure 5, Page 44). On Page 33, Section B - Planning states that a suitable use for the entire precinct would be "social, welfare and/or educational. We believe that the museum and the proposed vehicle cover fit this category of use, while the vehicle cover would be entirely within the limited heritage precinct and would have zero impact on the fabric of any existing building, including the buildings with the highest heritage value.

There will only be two steps in the erection process:

- Extension of the existing vehicle concrete hard standing, from the edge of the limited heritage precinct adjacent to the existing museum Annexe Building, to the gum trees in the North East corner of the grass parade ground, and then from the edge of the concrete hard standing in front of the Little Street entrance to the Barracks Southwards to the edge of the existing Cadet Unit demountable building
- Erection of the structures on the extended hard standing.

In summary, the Museum Committee believes the erection of the proposed vehicle cover will very significantly improve the preservation conditions for the heritage vehicle fleet and make it more easily accessible for the public to view. The choice of materials to be used, the design and colour of the cover and its position will mean that there is no impact on the fabric of any existing building and very limited impact on any key site line within the precinct.

Lancer Barracks is located in the center of the City of Parramatta, to the East of the railway station and bus interchange and adjacent to the soon to be demolished Arthur Phillip High School. It is an operational Army Barracks, home to the Royal NSW Lancers for over 120 years. It was built by Lieutenant John Watts, ADC to Governor Macquarie and a well known colonial architect, in 1820. The three remaining Macquarie era buildings are a double story Barrack building, the single story building with verandah known as Bob's Hall and, behind the Barrack building, the kitchen now used as the Regimental Sergeants' Mess. Later additions include a Federation Drill Hall (1901), the last one of its type still being used for military training, a small cottage and a double story, brown brick building, both of which date from Federation, were originally used as married quarters and now function as the Officer Mess and Regimental HQ offices respectively. On the Southern edge of the Barracks is now located Linden House, built in 1828 by the wife of Governor Dowling as the first school of industry for disadvantaged women of the colony of NSW. This building was purchased by the Museum, moved and rebuilt brick by brick and opened in 1967 to house the Regimental museum collection. It was consecrated as a War Memorial in the 1980's. These buildings edge the current entry into the Barracks from Smith Street, and also frame the grass parade ground.

Much enhanced protection and preservation of the Museum's Heritage listed vehicle fleet, in particular the internationally acclaimed WW2 Matilda Tank named ACE which has national and possibly international heritage significance. The heritage value of Lancer Barracks will have minor if any impact. The Significance assessment of the Museum's collection carried out by Tierney and Mason in 2010, stated that the Barracks was given added significance by the presence of the Museum and its collection, and that the Museum was given added significance by its location within Lancer Barracks. The preservation of the Museum's heritage fleet of vehicles will enhance the significance of the Barracks.

Although not an environmental matter, the Museum saved Linden House from demolition by purchasing the building from the AMP Society which was developing the site on which it had stood since 1828, removing and re-building it brick by brick to house the Museum's heritage listed collection. Linden House and its collection have since been consecrated as a War Memorial.

8.0 Provide a description of the feasible alternative?

Various other designs and quotes were considered, but the one whose computer generated images will be emailed separately was considered the least obtrusive. The only alternative to providing suitable overhead cover for the vehicles is to continue as present, with the vehicles under tarpaulins in the open (the heritage significant Covenanters Bridge Layer Tank is too big and complex to be covered by a tarpaulin and is deteriorating quickly), which is undesirable from conservation, public viewing, and resources to maintain (effort and time to tarp and untarp; tarpaulins deteriorate quickly and must be replaced regularly). Vehicles kept under a range of different tarpaulins of different ages and conditions arguably have a greater negative visual impact than well constructed and maintained overhead cover as proposed. The siting of the overhead cover is the very best available to minimise impact on the Barracks sight lines and is entirely contained within the precinct labelled Limited Heritage value.

The only possibility would be to more regularly replace the tarpaulins. This would be a continuing drain on limited museum funds. No grants are available for such expenditure - indeed one grant application was rejected because storing heritage vehicles under tarpaulins was not considered a permanent solution and very poor practice for the conservation of heritage vehicles and machinery. The construction of more permanent overhead cover would be easier for the museum to finance with a one-off fund raising campaign. Being far superior conservation practice, it is expected that some grant sources would become available that are closed to attempts to finance replacement tarpaulins.




